From the Manse

September 2018



Hymn No. 334 in Rejoice and Sing is Hilary Greenwood's hymn, "Walking in a garden". Hilary reflects on three of the gardens talked about in the Bible: the Garden of Eden, the Garden of Gethsemane and the garden around Easter's empty tomb. An old poem states, "One is nearer God's heart in a garden than anywhere else on earth" and I could be persuaded that there's something in that. Gardening and I have had a growing relationship over the years! What pleasure it brings me these days, although I have to admit that it wasn't always the case.

My first real manse, in Bideford, had a pleasant enough garden, complete with a greenhouse and a grape vine but, sadly, I knew little about gardening then and did little to it other than basic maintenance. It was Manse two, in Manchester, that started me off. When you're suddenly confronted with a rather large garden (two-thirds of an acre) you can't ignore it. Thankfully a previous minister had been a keen gardener and so it was nicely laid out with a more formal area close to the house and then a less formal area further away. I knew that I had to do something with it and that if I didn't keep on top of it, it would soon get on top of me so I began to learn a little - and suddenly found that I was enjoying it.

Cutting to Manse number five, in Brecon, and I soon realised that gardening was a non-starter there. In a very exposed position (but views to die for) it was a case of what the wind didn't destroy the rabbits would eat. I decided that God had set me in a stunning location so I'd make do with the landscape he provided, add a few pots in the summer to help out a bit on the colour front and call guits.

And so to Weybridge and Manse number six. Shall I tactfully just say that the manse garden was in need of a little attention and go for the art of understatement? Having cleared out some of the massively overgrown things there were, and in so doing having increased the size of the garden significantly, you may remember that some good friends of mine came down last year and gave me a hand to get something started. A year on things are beginning to bush out and become established. As last year progressed, I added things and I am also immensely grateful to some church members and to my neighbour opposite for giving me things from their gardens. "Every little helps." As last winter came, the garden was looking a lot more loved than it had been.

Sadly, a few things didn't survive the cold of the winter but I've replaced those and planted yet more in the various beds. I've also done a little more to the front garden but I have put much more energy into the back. This summer it's been a riot of colour and textures and I have been very pleased with it. Things planted last year have begun to fill out and I've also put in two scented honeysuckles - one behind the G&T bench and one against the back wall of the house so that in a few years the rooms might be scented of a summer's evening.

One of the things I've discovered is that 10 minutes in the garden during the mid morning and 10 minutes after lunch can achieve a lot but it can also refresh the mind and make it more productive. Then, in the evening, a little longer, staying on top of weeding and doing a bit of watering seems to calm me down and make me sleep better. The manse garden has become a little oasis and I'm grateful for it. My next project is to remove a large laurel, opposite the patio door, and extend the planting of a large border to give something nicer to look out at.

If you come into my study you might be a little surprised by the position of the desk. Sit in my chair though and you'll see exactly why it's where it is.

"The kiss of the sun for pardon,
The song of the birds for mirth,-One is nearer God's heart in a garden
Than anywhere else on earth."

Dorothy Gurney's poem may hardly be of Shakespearian standard but I still think she's on to something!

A BRIGHT FUTURE BECKONED, BUT NOT IN BANKING

Bill (William) Currie McCrorie

The young Bill McCrorie left Scotland for New Zealand in 1955 with a contract to work for ANZ Bank and a promising career ahead of him. Three years later he returned, married, and on the path to becoming a Presbyterian minister.

Bill was born in Ayr and had a fairly traditional upbringing, attending Ayr Academy followed by two years' national service in the Royal Air Force. When he went to New Zealand, Evelyn followed and they were married in 1957. Accepting a call to ministry, he took a degree in philosophy and history at Auckland University and on returning to Scotland he completed his training at Trinity College, Glasgow University.

Bill and Evelyn and their two daughters, Pauline and Jennifer, came south to St Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Walton-on-Thames, in 1970. This was a church founded by a group of expatriate Scots in the 1930s; it was only 30 minutes by train from central London and was a great change from Galloway, where Bill had ministered for the Church of Scotland.

He was then 37 years of age and was eager to establish his ministry at St Andrew's. He did this by becoming involved with pastoral care, joining existing activities as well as creating new ones. He was keen to promote dialogue with other ministers and arranged regular meetings with colleagues. As a "braw lad frae Ayr' he was a lover of Burns and so a Burns Night supper became a regular feature each year.

The structure of the Presbyterian Church of England was to alter with the formation of the United Reformed Church in 1972. Bill's approach was patiently to help church members to understand the need for change; when the time came, approval was given without hesitation.

He delivered well constructed and thought-provoking sermons; his experience at Glasgow University led him to quote frequently from the work of Professor William Barclay. He also led the membership through major extensions to meeting rooms and the church hall. Nearly 30 years later he is still remembered, with gratitude, by those who benefitted from his ministry.

He went on from Walton to serve for seven years as Southern Synod Training Officer. He undertook his new role with enthusiasm, and produced training programmes, particularly for ministers, which brought encouragement and benefit to all who engaged in them. He will be remembered for his cheerful and professional approach to everyone with whom he worked. During this time, he was also minister at East Sheen.

Bill McCrorie was born on 15 December 1933 and died, aged 82, on 5 October, 2016.



A good congregation gathered on 29 July at Weybridge URC for a service based on the Parable of the Mustard Seed, in which we remembered all sorts of things from Sunday School days and sang a number of the songs. As we went in we were given four different hymn books - all original copies of Sunday School Hymnary, Sunday School Praise, Carey Boner's "Child Songs" and CSSM Choruses, plus an

order of service telling us which Sunday School Department we were nominally in.

Beginning with "All things bright and beautiful" (using both the well known tunes) and ending with "Praise him, Praise him all ye little children" we covered all sorts of things in between including, Bible

choruses such as "The wise man built his house upon the rock" and "Zacchaeus was a very little man" and simple hymns such as , "Jesus wants me for a sunbeam" and "Jesus loves me, this I know." We thought about the development of Sunday Schools, the founding of the National Sunday School Union and the ways in which everything was organised

The annual Sunday School Outing was always a treat and destinations were recalled, including, Skegness, Portree, "Doon the Watter" and Barry Island. A small amount of Sunday School

Memorabilia was also on display including a picture of the last of the John Williams' ships, owned by the London Missionary Society to transport missionaries around the world, a collecting bag from the Junior Department and a "mud hut" collecting box from the LMS.



A good few memories were stirred and we were able to drop our offering onto the plates whilst singing, "Hear the pennies dropping."

It's amazing how the memories revived showed the things many of us had in common. And it's also interesting to reflect on our own spiritual grow from the first seeds being sown in our lives by our parents, our teachers and our Sunday School Teachers.

HARVEST COLLECTION

Doesn't time fly as yet another autumn approaches! Our Minister and your Elders again hope that the



congregation will support our two causes – the URC's Commitment for Life scheme, run in conjunction with Christian Aid, and our own unique ArtPeace Cooperative in Zimbabwe. Donations will be shared 50/50. It is always good to hear how training and help from Christian Aid partners has changed lives

and brought joy. For example, here are a few messages from forum members in South West

Bangladesh, supported by Christian Aid partner Shushilan.

Kazol Mondol (right) "People are willing to learn. This is so important. I hear what is being said at meetings so, with the

training, I can go and try it out and then help others".

"Before Hurricane Aila hit us we used to get a good crop but, after Aila, the crops were not healthy and

the yield low. Through Shushilan, we have learnt to adapt. This has helped us to stay here. Now we use less seeds as we measure our fields out. First, we prepare the beds, then we sow the seeds and then plant them out in rows. Through this system nothing is wasted. Earlier it was haphazard but now we put them six inches apart in straight rows. It is simple and it reduces the fertiliser and makes it easier to harvest.



It would be good to be able to say that the recent election has put Zimbabwe on a firmer footing. However, Zanu PF, Mr Mugabe's old party, were

deemed to have won again but this issue is being hotly contested though the courts by the MDC - the opposition party who say they have evidence of glaring discrepancies in the voting procedure, although some International Observers comment that this election was run more fairly than the last. Meanwhile, the country continues to languish, governed by Mugabe's old guard. ArtPeace (below) and numerous others





despaired at the result, not least the senseless killing of six or more protesters by the Army. By midafternoon after results were known, much of Harare City centre resembled a war zone, with military helicopters flying overhead and armoured personnel carriers moving through burning debris. Nothing has changed for our friends and families, so support is needed more than ever.

SOME HIGHLIGHTS OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY 6-9 JULY 2018, NOTTINGHAM

The Revd Kevin Watson, Moderator of General Assembly, opened Assembly with a quotation from the late Revd Kim Fabricius. 'There is a Bible verse on a plaque in the birthing unit of a maternity ward: "Jesus said: 'Come to me all you who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you an epidural." 'Kevin called for Jesus' help in discerning God's will during the Assembly. 'Help us to come to this Assembly like an expectant family, knowing that what happens here will bring change.' Concluding the prayer for all at Assembly, Mr Watson said: 'When the pain comes ... grant us that heavenly epidural'! Revd Nigel Uden and Derek Estill were inducted as our new Moderators of General Assembly. In his first address as Moderator, Nigel spoke about the transformational potential of listening, hearing God's voice in one another and engaging with the world. Nigel said that when we get listening right, listening becomes 'the most potent agent of change'.

The Synod Moderators' Report

The Moderators' Report 'Giving up and taking up' is offered as a resource to all local churches, to help us take on all that God is calling us to as we Walk the Way. Our own Peter Pay and Moderator Clare Downing have both been elected as the Moderators of General Assembly 2020-2022 - congratulations to both. Amanda Mukwashi, Christian Aid's Chief Executive, spoke to us about the work of Christian Aid and Commitment for Life. She said, 'We know exactly what needs to be done. Let's stand together and really show a broken world that Christianity can heal, God can heal – and that's the message of the scriptures.'

Inter-Faith Dialogue

We welcomed a Rabbi, a Muslim Chaplain, and the Anglican Area Dean of Blackburn to an inter-faith conversation on the theme of Assembly 'Walking the Way: Living the life of Jesus today'. They discussed together the meaning of discipleship in the context of the faith traditions they represent. We also reaffirmed our commitment to engage with global and intercultural themes and our desire to make this engagement integral to the whole life of the United Reformed Church...

Future of Assembly

Things agreed included that:

- · Moderators will be inducted at the close of Assembly.
- Assembly will reduce in size and there shall be the same number of reps from each Synod (at least one third of which will be Ministers, one third Elders or lay).
- Assembly will revert to meeting annually from 2022 meeting centrally in the UK.

We also agreed a change to the way Assembly Moderators will be elected, nominees each to be given up to 3 minutes to present their biography and 3 minutes to respond to a question set by the Moderator.

All these changes are subject to approval by Synods.

Elders

We agreed an additional promise to be included at the ordination and/or induction of Elders, referring it to Synods and churches for approval. The Missing Generation: We accepted the report from the 20s-40s Task Group, urging churches, Synod meetings, and committees to consider the questions in it and to act accordingly. One question is whether we are encouraging and allowing those 20-40s we do have to exercise their ministries in the church?

Some Other Matters

- Recognising that some people wish to continue as members of the URC but are unable to remain in membership at a local church, we agreed to request each Synod to identify one or more local churches to hold their membership.
- The '12 Faces of Hope' exhibition arrived as Assembly, marking 50 years of the Israeli occupation of Palestine.
- The Equalities Committee presented a paper 'Encouraging equality, cherishing diversity'....
- We encouraged a flexible approach to the issuing of ministerial calls across the denomination, and agreed a definition of what it means to be an 'Active' minister!
