

Happy New Year- times two!

Dear friends

Happy New Calendar Year, when it begins on 1st January and Happy New Ecclesiastical Year which begins on 3rd December (Advent Sunday). In the new Ecclesiastical Year we move from Matthew's Gospel to Mark's and I will write a bit of an introduction to Mark's Gospel in the next Grapevine. This issue, however, is the Christmas issue so I ought to write a Christmas message – shouldn't I? Giving a Christmas message inspired by Mark's nativity narrative immediately creates a problem though. There isn't one. Nothing about his childhood either. Mark goes straight into the ministry of John the Baptist and it is through John's ministry that Jesus is introduced to us. The beginning of Mark's Gospel, by the way, always raises the scholastic eyebrow since the quotation attributed to Isaiah actually comes from Malachi!

The word, "Gospel" is the Old English translation of a Greek word meaning, "Good News". Mark isn't writing a biography and so it's perhaps worth reflecting that for him the good news of Jesus is brought directly from the prophetic line of what we would call the Old Testament.

Let's put that alongside some words from a well-known Advent hymn, *Come thou long expected Jesus, born to set thy people free.* In that hymn Wesley reflects upon Jesus as being the release from our sins and fears; upon his being the hope of the earth, the heart's joy and the source of our ultimate rest. Quite a lot – but it's not hard to see how that might all reflect back to the messages of the prophets, where Mark begins his work.

Quiet moments for quiet reflection can be few and far between as the rush of Christmas hits us with the gentleness of an Inter-City 125 going at full speed. I have just noticed something about Charles Wesley's hymn, though, and that's where it appears in our hymnbooks. Our current book Rejoice and Sing puts it in the Advent section, along with things like *On Jordan's bank* and *Hark the glad sound*. It's where you would think it would be. Congregational Praise (R&S's predecessor from the Congregational side) puts it in a section headed, "His reign and coming in power", alongside hymns such as *Jesus shall reign* and *Rejoice the Lord is King*. Similarly Church Hymnary, both revised and 3rd edition, (R&S's predecessor from the Presbyterian side) doesn't put it in the Advent section either but follows the same sort of line that Cong P does. That set me thinking. Obviously we tend to sing hymns from the Advent section of our hymnbook during Advent but grouping this one with hymns about Christ's presence and power, which we might sing throughout the year, does make sense. I am left reflecting just how much this message is not time-limited to Advent alone.

After the shepherds have returned to their flocks, the wise-men have pressed 'home' on their star-nav and Mary and Joseph get on with the task of bringing up their son, the 'message' of the prophets to us is key. John the Baptist may have had too narrow an understanding of Jesus' work but he did recognise that Jesus was coming imminently and set about preparing the way. So, drawing a Christmas message from Mark's nativity account may not be possible but Mark does affirm that the Good News of Jesus comes directly from hopes and prophecies. Christ's coming sets his people free and that is certainly well worth celebrating.

My good wishes to you all as we celebrate Christmas together – and my good wishes to you for a Happy New Year, both the Calendar Year and the Ecclesiastical Year, during which we shall discover more of Mark's Gospel together.

Some of you may prefer to make a monetary donation through the church. These donations will be used by the church to buy vouchers which the families can use to purchase food etc at a local supermarket. The Treasurer, Jem Ward, will be pleased to receive your donations and these may be made via Bank Transfer to the church's bank account indicating that it is for NE Surrey Children's and Families' Services, or by cheque made out to St Andrew's United Reformed Church, Walton and Weybridge or by cash. Please put your cheque/cash in an envelope marked 'NE Surrey Children's and Families' Services' and place them in the offertory plate by the door. (This may be done in advance if you are not going to be present on the day.) The Treasurer will add Gift Aid to your personal donation (making it worth 25% more to the charity) and your gift will then be included in the total payment made by the church.

SAVE THOSE STAMPS!

For the "Save the Children" Fund

Claire Ward's brother, Ian, a keen stamp collector, continues to sort and sell stamps in aid of the "Save the Children" fund.

He has raised approximately £265 this year, partly through your generous donations. He will, once again, be pleased to receive the used stamps from your Christmas cards.

However, the changeover, by Royal Mail, to new-style stamps with bar codes on them means that he can only make use of commemoratives. These are stamps with pictures (e.g. Christmas stamps showing the Magi or reindeer) rather than those which only show the King's, or the late Queen's head, on them. He can also sell foreign stamps. (Please leave the overseas stamps on the envelope and send the whole envelope.)

These stamps **cannot** be sold for charity:




He has, however, got a contact to whom he can pass used new-style stamps with bar codes:






WE WILL REMEMBER THEM


FOOD BANK




When I tell people I help at the Food Bank many are surprised and shocked that there is such a need in affluent Walton-on-Thames. My eyes have certainly been opened over the last few months and I have encountered many really lovely people who through circumstances beyond their control have had to attend our sessions. Some have been evicted by landlords wanting to increase their rates forcing young families apart and having to sofa surf, others fleeing from abusive relationships, refugees housed in local hotels with only a kettle for cooking with, old age pensioners unable to cope on the basic pension and - yes - the homeless. Even people who are in regular employment may have to resort to help from the Food Bank.

All our clients have to be referred through an agency, perhaps Social Services, the CAB, doctors or schools and have a certificate to present on arrival. Families are given four pre-packaged bags and singles two, containing basics such as long life milk, tea, coffee, cereal and tins. They can then choose extras which are on display. This can vary considerably depending on what local shops have donated. This week we had a lot of fruit and vegetables plus eggs. We also always offer toiletries, sanitary supplies, nappies, and cleaning products and even dog and cat food. So please keep your donations coming! There really is a great need in this area and it is much appreciated and very welcome.

REVD ROBERT CECIL MACAULAY

Minister of Weybridge URC 1989-96



At a wedding

Cecil died very suddenly on 12th October while on holiday in the Irish Republic with his wife, Pat. He grew up in Northern Ireland and he and Pat visited both areas regularly.

In his young days he was involved with the Boys' Brigade and as a leader he enjoyed organising various activities including the annual camp. Such was his enthusiasm for this latter activity that he even managed to persuade his then fiancée, Pat (a Home Economics teacher), to do the catering for a camp held in the week before their wedding! Professionally Cecil's first career was in personnel management (now known as human resources) and he and Pat lived in various parts of the country when they always became actively involved with a local church. It was through that kind of involvement that he first visited Weybridge as a member of a team giving a presentation on the provision of an ecumenical church centre in Milton Keynes (now known as Christ the Cornerstone) to a meeting of the URC District Council.

Cecil was ordained and inducted as Minister at Weybridge URC in 1989 following training for the ministry at Mansfield College, Oxford. His was the first ordination to take place in the church since that of the Revd Horatio Pack in 1891. Cecil was blessed with a prodigious memory for people and events and great organisational skills which, along with his sense of

humour, proved to be great assets in his ministry. He also seemed to have an endless supply of energy and apparently existed on relatively little sleep. I was his Church Secretary and when the doorbell rang late in the evening I knew who would be on the doorstep. It was amazing how straightforward church business became when we dealt with it whilst relaxing with a glass in hand!

Responding to the pastoral needs of the congregation was high on his list of priorities – so fast was his response on one occasion that he arrived at the hospital before the patient. Several families in the congregation were grateful for Cecil's help and support when they were trying to cope with some very distressing situations – as one young mother said "I am eternally grateful to him for all his care and everything he did for us". Personal care like this continued (when requested) even after he had left Weybridge during the periods when we were without a Minister. His 'caring' spread wider than the church and he was a Director of the Surrey Care Trust and an active member of the Rotary Club locally. He was also a Hospital Chaplain and Chaplain at a local school and college. As a magistrate he chose to serve on the Staines Bench feeling it would not be wise to serve more locally.

Cecil moved from Weybridge to Woking in 1995 with the special task of integrating the congregations of the church in York Road (originally a Congregational Church) and St Andrew's (formerly Presbyterian) as Woking URC, which he did successfully. He retired from Woking in 2005 and was always so pleased and proud to see how significantly the church has developed under the leadership of his successor.

Cecil and Pat had a house in a village in Buckinghamshire which they retained during his time at college and in Weybridge and Woking. After retirement in 2005 they returned to live there. Initially they became members of Newport Pagnell URC but then Cecil was asked to serve in the LEP based in their village, assisting the Anglican priest and taking services. He was also involved in leading services for other URCs in the area. It was at this time, too, that they were able to indulge their interest in world-wide travel.

Cecil's last public activity at Weybridge was preaching the sermon when the church celebrated its 150th Anniversary (Sesquicentenary) in May 2015. He and Pat looked back on their time in Weybridge with great affection. They both enjoyed reading the Weybridge News and, later, The Grapevine and keeping in touch. Weybridge was, after all, an important turning point in their lives.

Written in 1987 by John Bell and Graham Maule this contemporary carol (see Rejoice and Sing 178) poses two questions right at the beginning but is actually contemplative in approach, linking past and present in the wonder and surprise of the Incarnation. The music (John Bell's arrangement of the English traditional melody 'Scarlet Ribbons') - a tune we all know – provides a gently flowing accompaniment. John Bell is a Church of Scotland minister, hymn-writer, broadcaster, author and international lecturer but you will probably know him best through his work with the lona Community alongside his friend, Graham Maule. Initially they both worked among the young in deprived areas of Glasgow in the cause of social justice. Eventually they were able to form a group of young people to share in leading and extending this vital work. Their common interest in music and involvement with the lona Community led to the formation of a worship group for young adults and ultimately the development of liturgical material and resources based on the everyday experience of ordinary people. These resources were made available world-wide. Sadly this long collaboration came to an end in 2019 when Graham Maule died. In 2018 John Bell received the Cranmer Award for Worship from the Archbishop of Canterbury for his outstanding Christian witness, through hymn-writing, broadcasting and social action.

MEET PANASHE

Panashe, along with his friend Dickson, recently joined Artpeace. Many of his sculptures are of cormorants, also known as rain birds (photo left), for their ability to predict rain. Raised in



Guruve, he was surrounded by an artistic community of well-known first and second generation sculptors including his famous uncle, Bernard Matemera, He began sculpting in 1991 while still a secondary student and by 2000 was an apprentice to Maganiso Vissensio in Harare, developing his own style of artwork. Panashe enjoys teaching and sharing his African cultural traditions and art knowledge with others, including younger generations of sculptors. He works with most of the hardest stones found in

Zimbabwe - Fruit serpentine, Verdite, Opal, Cobalt, Serpentine, Springstone, and Lepidolite - his use of the stone's colour and texture is stunning. Panashe's work has

CHOLERA OUTBREAK Zimbabwe declares state of emergency in Harare.

The outbreak has so far killed dozens of people with more than 7,000 suspected cases. The city authorities state that the outbreak, spreading throughout the city, has invoked memories of a deadly outbreak in 2008, which resulted in the deaths of over 4,000 people, with at least 100,000 infected. Health authorities have





been struggling to contain the high number of admissions, according to the International Federation of the Red Cross. It cites a lack of health workers to manage the cases, as well shortage of supplies to stop the transmission. Zimbabwe has been battling the deadly cholera outbreak in recent months amid poor access to clean water. The



stench of sewage is overpowering in many areas (photo above right). **ARTPEACE** artist Coster's wife Emma, is down with the illness and he is very worried. was rushed into hospital. I received a plea for help to fund ECG and CT scans plus ambulance costs, so raced to Walton to transfer money which arrived within the hour. No NHS meant that patients must pay for treatment we take for granted. Scans were taken but all to no avail as she died on Tuesday. Her funeral took place on Friday 3rd November. Lizeni (55) had a tough life being widowed when young. Husband Levi was a superb artist. In desperate times, she was forced to send me the last of his work to sell (right). She supported an extended family of eleven and laboured in her field. Her beautiful art was in great demand – some readers will own her work. These photos show Lizeni



over the twenty years I have known her. The photo (below right) shows her holding a St Andrew's 'Good News' Bible I sent many years ago. **Verity Johnson**, CAFOD's Head of Region Africa said: It is shocking and tragic how many people here die early from poor treatment or other causes'.











A BIG THANK YOU to all those who supported Lizeni over the years, from covering the cost of her father's evesight operation so he could see his grandchildren more clearly - to school fees (a child she 'adopted' went on to University) - to buying her sculptures - to providing seed and fertilisers etc. Your support enriched this family's lives in more ways than you can ever imagine and was deeply appreciated. She had a strong faith and attended church and prayer groups regularly. She managed to listen to St Andrew's service via

WhatsApp a week before she died and so enjoyed feeling part of our church. Lizeni belonged to many women's groups and dozens greeted her with moving singing and dancing as she arrived



home two days before her funeral. Mike Masedza said: 'John, a dark cloud has settled on Artpeace. Liz was our sister and a very important, popular artist because she was the only active woman stone sculptor in Tafara and Mabvuku'. It almost feels like the end of an era.

NEW VENTURE: Artist Fortune is not a well man and has never recovered from

being tortured by Mugabe'e thugs many years ago

which crippled him. He struggles to make ends meet. However, with our donations he has bought some old used clothing (right) which he tries to sell earning a few dollars.

CHEERFULL NEWS: About a week later, despite suffering a big hit to their income, **Marlow URC's** congregation agreed to donate £3000 from Church funds to cover 25kgs. maize seed, 125kgs of varied compound fertilisers and chemicals for each member. Two days later



this generous donation arrived and the artists purchased the products which, weather and other



factors permitting, should ensure basic food for their extended families for around ten months. A truck made multi drop deliveries to their scattered homes. Lovemore James said: 'We are all so happy happy today, and are about to go and become farmers again as well as sculptors'. From Dickson: Thank you very much Marlow URC for the seeds and inputs - may God bless you'. From Coster: We thank our Marlow friends for their great effort which will change our lives.' Mike sent an appreciative video for their congregation. Marlow URC continue to punch above their weight and are a lifeline for Artpeace and their extended families where hundreds benefit!

SOUTHWARK CATHEDRAL'S OCTOBER SHOP SALES were good - an extra bonus with many artists and friends benefitting. Life is full of ups and downs for Artpeace, but these resilient folk are lifted with our support. The Nasho family send heartfelt thanks to those who helped with donations after their grievous loss. Sales coupled with Marlow URC's generosity has undoubtedly boosted morale but Christmas is looking rather bleak with little funds left. However, they will do their best to celebrate the festive season and wish their UK friends a very Happy Christmas. **Johnston Simpson**
