From The Manse July/August 2025

I think you all know that I am an avid watcher of "The Repair Shop". I know that many of you are as well. However, another programme I love watching is Stacey Solomon's "Sort Your Life Out". In case you have not seen it, Stacey and her team help families transform their homes with a major declutter as well as some upcycle and some recycling, too. Some changes are made to the family home whilst it's empty and when the family comes home it's all lovely and wonderful. It begins with the house being emptied and with everything then being taken to a large warehouse where it is all laid out so that people can see just how much stuff they have, where the duplicates are and have the opportunity (and encouragement!) to address the issues that are thus highlighted.

Bring Science to Politics – for Climate, Nature and Our Survival

On 13th May,Teresa and I joined over 150 other scientists in Parliament Square to 'Bring Science to Politics'. At the same time, Parliament was debating whether to remove some of the environmental protections from the Climate & Nature Bill. Our message was simple: MPs and policymakers must listen to the scientific consensus on the severity, urgency and consequences of climate and ecological breakdown, and ensure science informs political decisions.

Meeting at Grosvenor Hall in Westminster, we donned our white coats (the best way to show we are scientists!) and made our way to Parliament Square. Ordinarily, our white coats would have kept us warm on a cool Spring day in mid-May, but as the temperature was 10°C higher than average it was quite sweltering! But it really hit home the message that we wanted to share. Life on earth is in desperate peril.

Walking alongside us was TV broadcaster and naturalist, Chris Packham, who later gave a speech at the rally in Parliament Square. Here, Chris was joined by Mike Berners-Lee, an expert on climate science, sustainability and carbon footprinting, Robin Ince, the presenter of a popular radio science show, Dr Lynn Bjerke, a children's cancer researcher and climate activist, and Sir David King, former Chief Scientific Advisor to the UK Government. All gave impassioned speeches urging politicians to listen to the scientific experts. After the speeches, many of the scientists headed to the House of Commons to engage directly with their MPs on the need to prioritise policies that support the climate and nature.

We found it an uplifting experience to participate in this event. It was well-attended, good-natured and went off with no issues. It was especially encouraging to see so many young scientists participating and making their voices heard. We met people from all corners of the UK and made some new friends and hope to see them again, because we will need to come back again, and again...





Act Now, Change Forever

On Wednesday 9th July, we will be joining the Climate Coalition (which brings together over 130 organisations, including Christian Aid, the National Trust, Women's Institute, Oxfam and RSPB) at a 'Mass Lobby' in Westminster, with thousands of people from all over the UK coming to tell our MPs that it is time to protect what matters most – our health, our nature, our communities, our climate and our future. Attending protests that raise awareness of environmental issues can be a positive contribution to the Eco Church Report, helping churches towards a higher level of award. Interested? A NEW CHAPTER OPENS: The congregation will doubtless be following our ECO team's progress with interest. 7000 miles away in

Zimbabwe, climate change is biting hard, forcing a big change in attitudes. Marlow URC's attendance like St Andrew's, has dropped alarmingly over the years so given this uncertain outlook,



we must encourage ArtPeace to become more self-reliant through sustainable farming as future funding is not a given. After their recent

taster one day course, they have been registered for a three day course with Foundations for Farming (FfF), a Christian based registered non- profit organisation, from the 7th to 9th October.

Pfumvudza, a Shona word with ancient traditional heritage meaning 'new season', is a product initiated by Berin Stock, a retired Zimbabwean commercial farmer, who asked himself a key question. 'How much land is required to feed a family?' Using all the FfF principles, assuming a family would require a bucket of maize per week to provide their staple diet, the following model was developed. To fill a bucket with shelled maize one would require 56 cobs weighing 300 grams each. If each maize plant produced at least one of these one would require 56 plants. The FfF spacing of planting stations within a row is 60cm and each station would have 2 plants, thus requiring a row of only 16m to produce a bucket of maize. If one is to produce a bucket for each week of the year this would mean one would need 52 of these rows. At a row spacing of 75cm this would mean the block would be 39m long. 16m by 39m is only $\frac{1}{16}$ of a Hectare.



After initial reluctance from some artists (old habits die hard), I encouraged them to undergo this training. They will be taught due diligence on following farming procedures in land preparation and crop maintenance. Seed sowing normally commences in November and funding will be required to buy starter packs (55\$ each) containing 4 or 5 other small sacks of various fertilisers, chemicals and seed. This expense will be hugely less than past funds used to buy various compound fertilisers, seed and chemicals.


Christian Aid Week 2025 Abounding hope

Thank you all for supporting Christian Aid Week – in total, we raised £1,037.50 (including Gift Aid). What a wonderful result!

During Christian Aid Week, we learned about Aurelia, an inspirational farmer and community leader in Guatemala, who is also a grandmother wanting to take care of her family. Aurelia is a change-maker; she is determined to encourage other women and show them what they can achieve together.

Cacao is a native plant in Guatemala and although it is drought-resistant, it is becoming more difficult to grow because of the rising temperature and changes in rainfall patterns. Indigenous communities like Aurelia's have done the least to cause the climate crisis, yet they are experiencing the worst effects. With the help of Congcoop, Christian Aid's partner in Guatemala, Aurelia and her neighbours have been given equipment to help them make chocolate from their cacao harvest. This gives Aurelia a source of regular income that she can spend on daily essentials like soap. It also helps her to keep her grandchildren in school. Congcoop has also encouraged Aurelia and other indigenous farmers to stand up for their rights as pressures increase on them to give up their land.

By continuing to support Christian Aid, we are helping people on the brink of survival to find the strength and opportunity to push back against poverty and to fulfil their hopes and ambitions.

CHIPTER OND FRIENDS

MEMORIES: A recent visit by Lovemore James to Charles Fundisi, an artist with whom I had lost contact, jogged my memory. Around 16 years ago, several heavy crates of sculptures arrived on a container ship at Southampton, destined for Walton, Marlow and Kettering URC's. It was a rather tortuous exercise dealing with two Zimbabwean agents in differing parts of the country.

Hundreds of large and small pieces were well wrapped in bubble wrap, packed in wooden crates then nailed down with six inch nails. A lorry took the crates to

Johannesburg, where they were transferred onto another vehicle for Durban and hence by ship (right) to Antwerp - then transferred onto another ship for Southampton. A truck delivered the crates to



the churches and my home! A few hiccups were encountered on route not least from one Zimbabwean agent who insisted on a higher fee or he would block discharge. However, he did not realise he was dealing with a Scot but that's another story! A photo of Marlow's congregation



lifting heavy sculptures from the back of the vehicle

(right) into the church has stuck with me. Quote from their then Church secretary Martin Ashford (left): 'Getting involved with this project is proving very exhilarating and also humbling.



It's certainly turning for me into something that goes well beyond just putting on an exhibition'. This scene was replicated at the other URC's. Each piece was meticulously catalogued and



artistically displayed in their sanctuaries. (e.g. Marlow left). Hazel from Kettering URC said: We had so much fun although it was hard work'. It was a roaring success thanks to volunteers from each church showing the URC at its best and it's still a talking point. A considerable sum of money was raised. Mike Masedza said: 'We cherish those days which transformed our lives.' Returning to Charles Fundisi, Lovemore said: 'He is still recovering from a stroke trying to carve and make ends meet but it's so difficult for him although his hand and leg is improving but he still cannot speak. He was very happy to hear that you will try and help sell his Nativity pieces and managed a smile. His wife Ruth (in photo with Charles) also tearfully thanked me as it's difficult to find

money for his physiotherapy'. Marlow bought Charles's moving work 'The Last Supper' from their

2010 exhibition. It is located in the entrance of the church under an acrylic box for protection where visitors can view same marked with a brass plaque. I told the artists their work will live on



and be admired long after they have gone – how many of us can say that! Hundreds of homes now boast one or more sculptures - St. Andrew's display a stunning piece in their Gateway titled 'Christ Arising' in lemon opal stone carved by the late Andrew Mabanji – sadly his last creation.


THE RECENT
